## The three pillars of the First Nations Clean Energy Network

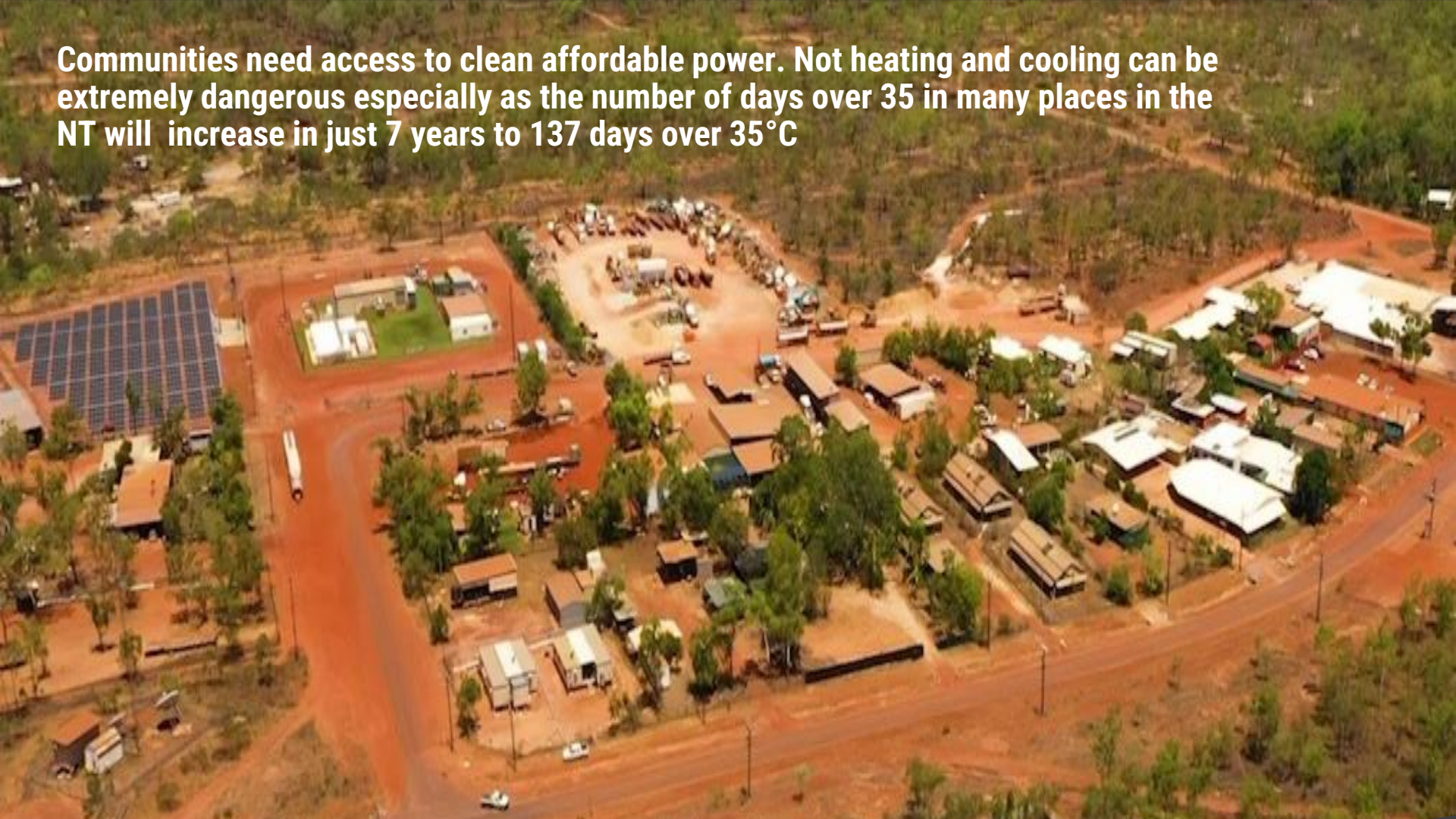
- **Community:** Focus on removing barriers to our people having access to secure, cheaper, cleaner energy. Develop guides for land councils and community organisations to be equipped and ready to engage and benefit. Build capacity and advocate for opportunities for our people to be at the table, influencing and shaping the energy transformation.
- **Policy reform:** Policy reform and changes to the way renewables are delivered to First Nations households. Demonstrate projects to highlight State, Territory and Federal policy barriers and work to overcome them. Governments at all levels to invest in these reforms and lift the barriers.
- **Industry partnerships:** Best practice principles for companies to implement and investors to require, that ensure First Nations engagement and consent in development, design and implementation – including benefit sharing – of any clean energy projects.

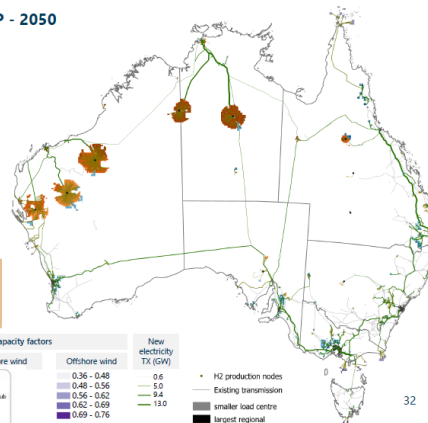

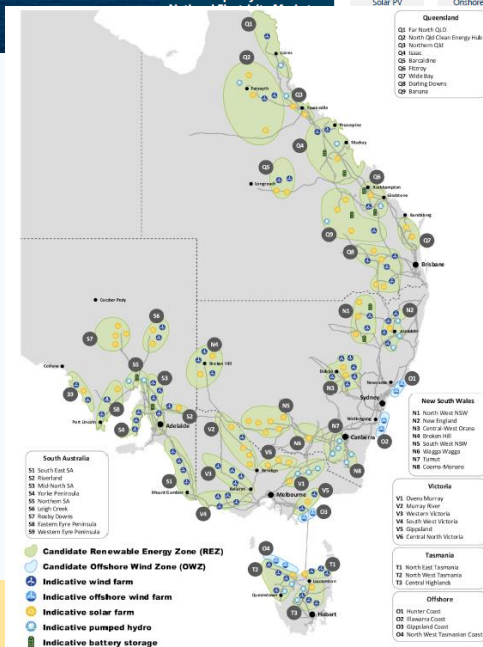
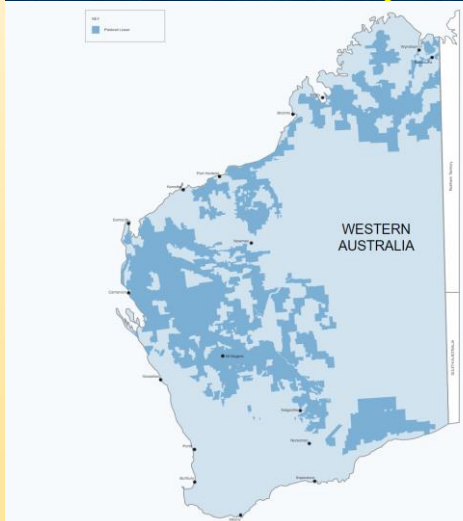
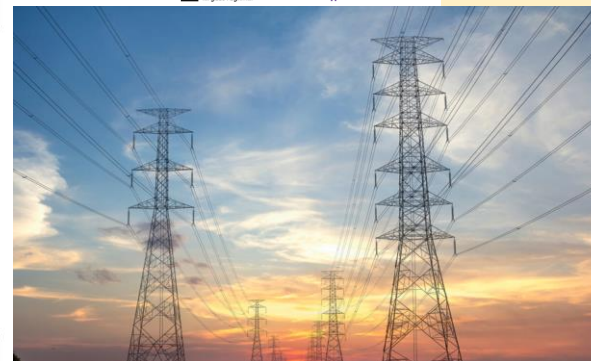


Figure 1.1 Renewable Energy Zone locations in the draft 2022 Integrated System Plan

Meeting Communique

Friday 28 October 2022

ENERGY MINISTERS MET TODAY TO DISCUSS THE PRICE PRESSURES FACING THE EAST COAST ENERGY MARKET, ASSESS PROGRESS MADE ON PRIORITY MARKET REFORMS AND TAKE FURTHER COLLECTIVE ACTION ON THE ENERGY SECTOR TRANSFORMATION TO NET ZERO.

A priority action under the Partnership agreed by Ministers in October was working with First Nations Australians to co-design a **First Nations Clean Energy Strategy**. Ministers acknowledged the Commonwealth's \$5.5 million investment to **kick-start and support the co-design process and strategy development**, and \$83.8 million for **microgrids in remote First Nations communities**. This funding will leverage and build on the best practice work of jurisdictions, First Nations communities and organisations to shape the Strategy, including identifying priority reforms and investment needed to deliver what's needed into the future.

## The Principles

1. Engage respectfully
2. Prioritise clear, accessible and accurate information
3. Ensure cultural heritage is preserved and protected
4. Protect country and environment
5. Be a good neighbour
6. Ensure economic benefits are shared
7. Provide social benefits for community
8. Embed land stewardship
9. Ensure cultural competency
10. Implement, monitor and report back
