## Background

- Commenced as the inaugural National Wind Farm Commissioner in November 2015 – for an initial three year term.
- Role was created in response to a 2014-15 Senate Select Committee inquiry into the wind farm industry and its impact on communities
- Independent role, reporting to the Federal Parliament and relevant Minister
- Extensive review of the role and stakeholder feedback by CCA in 2018
- Re-appointed in October 2018 for a further three year term. The role was also extended to include large-scale solar farms and storage facilities.
- In March 2021, the Minister announced the further expansion of the Commissioner's role to include new major transmission projects.
- In October 2021, was re-appointed for a four year term
- Role name also changed now known as the Australian Energy Infrastructure Commissioner.

### Role

- The Commissioner's primary activities include:
  - Facilitating the handling of complaints from concerned community residents about proposed and operating wind farms, solar farms, energy storage facilities and new major transmission projects;
  - Identifying and promoting best practices for industry and government in relation to community and landholder engagement, planning, development, operation and maintenance of such projects; and
  - Improving information quality, access and transparency by industry and government – to the community about proposed and operating projects.



### Case data

- As at 30 June 2023, the Office had received 891 cases since the inception of the Office.
- These include the following:
  - 443 cases about proposed wind farms (across 83 projects)
  - 98 cases about operating wind farms (across 27 projects)
  - Six cases about proposed Offshore wind farms (one declared zone)
  - 22 cases about proposed solar farms (across 15 projects)
  - 169 cases about proposed large-scale transmission projects (across 6 projects)
  - 11 cases about proposed storage facilities (pumped hydro 3 projects)
  - 142 cases were general enquiries or did not specify a particular project.
- Overall, as at 30 June 2023, we have received 651 complaints about *proposed* projects compared with 98 complaints about *operating* projects.

#### Total issues raised in cases


(As of 30 June 2023)



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#### Issues raised in cases (transmission) (As of 31 March 2023)


■ 2021 ■ 2022 ■ 2023

### Recent concerns – wind and solar

- Wind farms concerns relating to visual impacts, commercial agreement, safety incidents, decommissioning, aviation safety lighting, recycling of blades.
- Solar farms concerns relating to hydrology impacts, loss of use of agricultural land, visual impacts, bushfire ignition and fire-fighting limitations, recycling of panels.
- Construction issues damage to property, re-routing of roads, gates, road design impacts on farming, extended land use, rubbish removal, subcontractor issues.
- Community noise and dust, disruption and inconvenience, impacts to local businesses and resources, dislocating the social order.
- Litigation challenges planning & permit procedures, allegations regarding noise impacts, health impacts and nuisance.

#### **Current concerns - transmission**

- Commercial discussions happening at the end of the process rather than the start
- Skills and capabilities of landholder liaison and community engagement personnel
- Quality and timeliness of communications and correspondence
- Economic disparity c/f wind, solar including impacts on neighbours
- Perceived impacts on visual amenity, property values, farming practices/capacity, natural environment, bushfire ignition and response
- Proliferation of wind/solar/storage developers descending into the area
- Impacts and imposts as a result of land access for surveys/assessments
- Impacts and imposts during construction of transmission line.

### The Review

- Independent Review announced 4 July 2023 by Minister Bowen
- Known as the Community Engagement Review
- Due to report by December 2023
- Lead by Andrew Dyer, with Secretariat provided by DCCEEW
- Public submissions, including a survey, open from 4 September 2023 until 1 October 2023
- Roundtable meetings and interviews (in person and virtual) during September and first half of October 2023
- This week in Sydney, Dubbo and Tamworth
- Meetings include NSW Government, AER, ETU, Muswellbrook Shire, Wellington Aboriginal Action Panel, NSW FA, Dubbo Regional Council, Community Groups, Host Landholders, Lawyers, New England Councils

### **Review – Areas of Focus**

- Engagement requirements and responsibilities related to:
  - Developers/Proponents
  - Landholders (hosts)
  - Near Neighbours
  - Broader Community
  - Councils and Shires
  - Other key stakeholders (e.g. Agriculture, Farming, Environment, First Nations, Emergency Services, Transport, State and territory governments, Federal government, etc.)
  - Other reviews
- What is working well, what is not, what needs to be fixed and how
